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## ***Solidarity with Striking Workers***

One key area of labour movement activity with which many Unison retired members in our region are involved – as delegates, supporters and friends – is that of local trade union councils. Through them we have played a particularly important role during the current wave of strikes, taking trade council banners and solidarity greetings from the collective of affiliated unions to the picket lines in our communities and helping to organise rallies and demonstrations. Jamshid Ahmadi and Liz Payne-Ahmadi, both Unison retired members and delegates from Somerset Local Government and Community Branch to their local trades council, have been speaking to *Retired Life* about their experience of doing just this:

“Since the RMT rail workers held their first strike on 21<sup>st</sup> June 2022, we have had the privilege of standing with the trades council’s big red banner in support of striking workers at 60 picket lines in the Taunton area. These include those of RMT (rail), CWU (Royal Mail), UCU (Bridgwater and Taunton College), RMT (bus), Unison (SW Ambulance), PCS (Driving Examiners, DWP and Charity Commission), NEU (Teachers), RCN (Nurses), BMA (Junior Doctors) and Prospect (UK Hydrographic Office).

“All the workers we met, many on strike for the first time in their lives, were absolutely committed to the public services they run and were very angry and frustrated that they had been put in the position, by their employers and the government, of having no other option but to withdraw their labour to secure a wage on which they could live, safe working conditions and properly funded services for all of us.

“One of the biggest highlights for us was meeting and talking with Unison’s general secretary, Christina McAnea, when she visited the picket line of ambulance workers outside the ambulance station in Taunton with our regional secretary, Joanne Kaye. How pleased the striking workers were to see her!

“But the thing that stands out most for us over the months is the tremendous level of public support for those taking industrial action – the honking of horns, ringing of cycle bells, clapping and, of course, the ‘in person’ greetings from the many passers by and those who came especially with welcome cakes, pizzas, and chocolates to sustain the picket line. This support has been consistent throughout, despite the negative mass media barrage about the unaffordability of claims and every attempt to divide workers from workers by giving precedence to one group over another.

“This long period of action has helped unions and their members in our community to get to know each other, support each other’s pickets, meet together to voice common demands in local rallies and demonstrations and be seen by the public. Many of the linkages that will be the strength of the labour movement going forward have been built and facilitated by the trades councils. As Unison retired members and trades council delegates it has been good to have the opportunity to contribute in even a very small way to the seeking of justice by working people.”

## *Winter Deaths*

Whilst I usually try to be as up-beat as possible we simply cannot underestimate the impact of winter deaths in the older population. The figures released of excess winter deaths was 13,400 from 1 December 2021 to 31 March 2022. These figures are always published belatedly and when they are next announced I doubt there will be any cause for celebration.

We are paying the price not just of the pandemic but gross underfunding of health and social care with an over-stretched, underpaid, and exploited workforce struggling to deliver.

The impact of poverty wages and squeezed pensions, rising inflation and unprecedented food and energy costs is profound and must not continue. Many of these deaths are linked to those who are unable to afford high energy costs and are living in cold, damp and poorly insulated homes.

Vulnerable people and their relatives are getting a raw deal and the emotional impact in one of the richest countries in the world is too great. Yet successive governments have simply ignored the problem. UNISON is making its voice heard and has send a message to the government about these excess winter deaths and the reasons behind them.

The family funeral was on 1 February 2023 in Torquay.
